The Worcester Public Schools has a voluntary student assignment policy, utilizing its Magnet School Network and its school of choice options.

All elementary school students registering or transferring into the Worcester Public Schools are required to do so at the Parent Information Center. Staff at the Center assists parents in the selection of an educational environment that meets the academic needs of their child. This

allows parents the opportunity to take advantage of the diverse educational opportunities that exist within the Worcester Public Schools.

The Parent Information Center continues to provide parents with:

- 1. Information regarding the established Student Assignment Policy;
- 2. Assistance in obtaining access to specialized resources available in the Worcester Public Schools;
- 3. Assistance with on-site visits to all schools within the system;
- 4. Help in the initial stages of registration required by the school; i.e., proof of birth, immunization records and proof of Worcester Residency.
- 5. Assurance that all Worcester Public Schools parents are fully informed of all important news, events, and educational opportunities being offered by the school system.

The Parent Information Center serves as the main source of information and assistance to all new students entering the Worcester Public Schools. The goal of the Center is to provide parents with all information relative to the advantages and opportunities for their children in Magnet and Choice schools.



SCHOLARSHIPS & TUITION WAIVER PROGRAM

Please note that each year youth must complete the FAFSA (<u>www.fafsa.ed.gov</u>) in order to be eligible for the following programs.

The Foster Child Tuition and Fee Waiver Program provides free undergraduate tuition and fees (at the in-state rate) to foster children at any one of Massachusetts' 29 state and community colleges and universities. Approved by the Board of Higher Education in June of 2000, this initiative was expanded to include fees in July of 2008. Youth eligible for the state college undergraduate or certificate tuition and fee waivers include:

A current or former foster child who was placed in the custody of the Department of Children and Families and remained in custody through age 18 without subsequently being returned home. The youth must have been in custody for at least six months prior to age 18; or Youth who had been in the custody of the Department of Children and Families and whose guardianship was sponsored by the Department of Children and Families through age 18.

Please note: prospective students must meet the admission criteria for the institution and must complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid.

Youth may use the waiver until age 25.

Foster Child Grant Program

Foster Child Grant Program provides grant monies for youth attending public and private postsecondary school full time in a degree granting program. Eligible youth were in the custody of the Department of Children and Families until age 18 and unable to return home and were not adopted. Eligible youth must also meet the following conditions:

- Is a permanent legal resident of MA
- Is a US citizen or noncitizen eligible under Title IV regulations

- Is not over the age of 24
- Has not earned his or her baccalaureate degree
- Has signed a voluntary agreement with the Department of Children and Families establishing the terms and conditions for receiving such aid
- Is enrolled full time (12 credits or its equivalent)
- Has applied for financial aid, using the standard Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)
- Is in compliance with applicable law regarding Selective Service
- Is not in default of any federal or state student loans for attendance at any institution or owe a refund for any previous financial aid received and
- Is in good standing and meets the institution's requirements for satisfactory academic progress.

The maximum award per academic year is \$6000 for eligible students enrolled in public institutions or private non-profit or private for profit institutions.

Youth must file a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) form and a Statement of Eligibility to qualify.

Educational and Training Voucher Program

DCF Education and Training Voucher Program

The DCF Education and Training Voucher Program provides up to \$5000 per academic year for post-secondary educational or vocational training programs, including colleges and trade schools and related costs of attendance (tuition, fees, room and board, books, transportation, day care) as defined in the Higher Education Act of 1965. Eligible youth are:

- Youth who were adopted through DCF after attaining age 16;
- Youth who were in DCF custody (any type) until age 18, unable to return home and have not yet reached age 23 or
- Youth who were in DCF sponsored guardianships with kin after attaining age 16. Youth must be US citizens or noncitizens lawfully admitted for permanent residence (a green card).

Youth must have achieved a high school diploma or GED certificate to be eligible for ETV funds. Youth must apply to the program before they turn 21 and can use the ETV Program until their 23 rd birthday.

William Warren Scholarship

The William Warren Scholarship Program provides scholarships for educational and vocational programs to any youth under age 25 who was in the care/custody of DCF for a minimum of one year. Scholarships range from \$250 to \$4000. Both current and former DCF youth are eligible.

WIC is a health and nutrition education program serving pregnant and postpartum women, infants, and children under the age of five.

WIC provides vouchers for nutritious foods and infant formula.

This program helps you and your family buy food needed for good health. You can buy food from most grocery stores and other retailers that sell food. If you meet the program guidelines, you will get a special debit card (called an EBT Card). This debit card comes with a certain amount of money already on it to pay for food. The amount of money you get on the card may depend on three things:

- household income from all sources (earned and unearned) such as money you get from a job, Social Security, SSI, or interest
- how many people live in your household
- where you live

You can use the card at most grocery stores, certain senior centers, and some meal delivery services such as Meals on Wheels. It works just like a regular debit card. You buy your groceries using the card and the cost is taken out of the total amount on the card. More money is put on your debit card on a monthly basis.

DCF CONTACT INFORMATION:

Navigating the DCF System for Foster Parents

Knowing who to call and when, is always a challenge as a foster parent.

Hopefully, these simple guidelines will help you decide when you have issues or concerns that need to be addressed.

Concerns/Issues related to the children in your home:

Anything concerning the needs of the children should be directed to the Social Worker assigned to the **birth family**.

Examples are the child's behavior, school services, counseling/therapeutic services, family visitation, court involvement, medical/dental issues, mental health issues, need for respite, babysitting, or daycare, out of state travel, or anything else directly related to the child.

- 1. Contact the Social Worker directly and if they do not pick up, leave a message. Allow 24 hours for a return phone call. If it is an emergency, ask for the Supervisor immediately.
- 2. If the Social Worker is unavailable, call their Supervisor; if they do not pick up, leave a message.

If it is an emergency, ask that the Supervisor be paged or ask for a covering Supervisor in the event the Supervisor is not in the office.

Concerns/Issues Related to You as a Foster Parent:

Family Resource Workers support you as a foster parent and can sometimes help mediate issues within the Department.

Examples of when to call the Family Resource Worker – payment issues, family /or household changes, when you move, to approve a babysitter, and when you have tried to resolve issues/concerns and need support.

DCF Placement Resolution Committees:

At any time, you can request a meeting to discuss unresolved issues related to a placement in your home.

This meeting will take place in the Area office and, at a minimum, the Social Worker, Supervisor, Family Resource Worker, and Family Resource Supervisor will attend. Contact the social Worker or your Family Resource Worker to request this meeting.
